

January 2023, how quickly we find ourselves in a New Year. I must share that I am both concerned and excited about the challenges we will face this year. We will focus, like always, on our primary mission, that being our school and the young people with whom we have the privilege of sharing our knowledge.

The challenges that come with school, church, and maintenance are our focus and responsibility. It is a comforting thought to know La Vida does and can exist because of the good Lord and all those that support and contribute in many ways to the life of La Vida. Part of the "life blood" of the mission is our visiting schools and churches that organize working groups, travel here, and willingly complete much of the routine maintenance and upkeep that would be impossible to achieve without their efforts.

The current major mission project is the upgrade of our water well, the water storage tank, and the water hydrant which provides many gallons of water to our local Navajo community. I must admit that this project is now facing some serious challenges. We have been in contact with an organization called Dig Deep whose mission is to provide potable water to people in certain areas of our country where water is not easy to obtain. Initially we thought that we could work together to provide water to families in the immediate vicinity of our mission. However, due to unforeseen circumstances, that can not happen in the near future; although we are optimistic it will happen sometime in the future. Starting immediately we will be ordering our new water tank and begin the preparation work to set the tank and modernize the new water hydrant.

We thank each of you who contributed to cover the cost of sending our older students to Phoenix for GYC . This learning experience was so important for our students. Thank God they all returned safely, in spite of the weather challenges and driving conditions. We will have more pictures and the story next month. Praise God for the generosity of each of you who continue to support our mission. In closing I would like to add this personal thought. During my time on earth I have had the privilege to work and travel all around

Water Project Update

Hello My Dear Brothers and Sisters!

I pray each of you were blessed this Christmas Season with the joy of the reason for our celebration and of being with families and friends.

Our latest totals for the water project as of the 28th of December, 2022 are \$118,719. As you know, it is our goal to be able to continue to provide safe and bountiful water not only to La Vida Mission but also to our neighbors free of charge.

Mr. Lee, Pastor Mark Phillips of the Farmington SDA Church, John Husby, our maintenance supervisor and I met with representatives from Dig Deep and the Navajo Water Project via Zoom on December 20, 2022. Today, I received an email from Emma Robbins, Executive Director of the Navajo Water Project, informing us that they do not feel our project is a good fit for them at this time. She did encourage me to apply for a grant from the Navajo Water Project when the window is opened in 2023.

Tests have been conducted to determine how long it takes the well to recover from being pumped and how long it takes the storage tank to refill. The test at the well shows that the well has recovered 15 feet of water in 5 minutes, which is very good. The well pumped 25,200 gallons in 23 hours in one test and 26,500 in 24 hours in another test. These test results are important as we continue with this project.

We have authorized our consulting engineer to contact D & R Tank out of Albuquerque, NM, to purchase our new water tank. The revised quote for the tank is \$88,346. This includes the 18,000 gallon tank itself with all required appurtenances to meet current code, anchor brackets, inlet and outlet underground piping, drain nozzles, delivery, unloading and setting up the tank and initial chlorination. What the quote does not include is the actual bedding ring that is required by the State Environment Department, taxes, road work for site access, soil testing, hydrostatic testing, bacteriological tests, licenses, permits and host of other items. We anticipate the tank to be completed by March or April. We expect to complete the project by summer.

Steps being taken by the Mission itself include providing site access for the new tank and demolishing the old tank (savings of \$20,000).

Dan Flack, our consulting engineer will complete the geotechnical investigation, develop a site plan for the new tank and design the tank foundation and detail within the next two months. He will also continue to guide us through this almost overwhelming project and I will work closely with him to complete the project.

Again, we so appreciate all each of you have contributed to this project. Water is life.

I wish you the very best for 2023 and all of our Lord's blessings for each of you!

That wonderful visit has opened the door to new plans. When school starts in January, we are going to start writing about the stories we heard.
