the classroom and on the playground playing with our students, who enjoyed the interaction. We are so blessed and refreshed to have mission groups again. We are looking forward to having more in the next few months.

Water Project Update

Hello Dear Friends,

I think spring is here. We have all four seasons in one day and the wind is blowing my raked up leaves back into the yard. It is nice to see some green and especially the early spring flowers.

The latest figures regarding our water project is \$81,348. We are getting closer and closer. THANK YOU to all our donors!

So, where are we now? I sent a letter of inquiry to D & R Tank on March 21, 2022, outlining the items the NM Engineering Service Program has said we need to have completed regarding the replacement of our water storage tank. The Engineering Program states we need an engineering design summary from a NM Licensed Professional Engineer, an initial disinfection plan and a designed foundation for the tank. Further, we need a hydraulic analysis to ensure that the new tank will provide adequate pressure to the distribution system and a geotechnical report showing that the existing soil conditions are adequate to support the new tank. As of today, March 29, 2022, I have not heard from D & R Tank.

Some of the above items were added to our "to do" list when the NM Water

Department told us that we would need to make application to the Engineering Service Program for a Modification of a Public Water System. It is my understanding that D & R Tank will be able to provide all those items.

Two other deficiencies are to be addressed: 1. To determine if our ground water is surface water influenced. You've heard this before, but I'm still waiting for the NM Water Department to tell us how we can test for this. 2. The Community Water Hydrant still needs to be re-built in such a way that contamination does not enter our water distribution system.

We were granted a time-extension to complete these items until August 2022. Please continue to pray with us as we move forward. In the first part I mentioned the dear 82 year old, Sabbath-keeping lady who gave me a Bible, Christ Object Lessons, and the 9 volume Testimonies to the Church. I was intrigued by her life and kindness. She taught me to pray and loved me.

With that wisdom in tow, I went to the Rio Grande Valley city of Weslaco where my mother and step father were editing the local newspaper. There I began to read the Bible for the first time in my life. I also continued to keep the Sabbath. I would never get in a car or pick a flower because that would be doing my own pleasure. But in spite of my misunderstanding, it was a joy, albeit a lonely one.

You see Ma, that kind lady who gave me my first Bible, was not actually a Seventhday Adventist. She had been disfellowshipped for talking to the Shepherd's Rod people. Wonderfully, she told me that, if I needed to, I could always contact the Seventh-day Adventists.

About three months after I moved home, the library where I went to study my Bible was closed for Easter. I remembered that Ma said I could always go to the Adventists. So I walked over to Valley Grande Academy. Asking for a place to study, I was taken to the attic of the girl's dorm. A bit later, the pastor's teenage daughter came up and got my name and phone number.

The following week, Ellyn, a friend from Austin, visited me. She was a follower of an Indian guru who was made famous by the Beatles. She actually was one of the select group allowed to be part of his group living with him in Switzerland. Ellyn was teaching me yoga

and deep meditation when the phone rang. I was just at the point where I was almost in a trance when the obnoxiously loud phone rang in my room. A booming voice said, "Mary Claire, this is Pastor Gilbert Goodwyn. Would you like to come to our Sabbath School?" I replied with an emphatic, "No!"

I tried to get back to my meditative state, but the spell was broken. Not only that, but after Ellyn left, when I tried to do the yoga exercises, my intestines became so cramped for three days that I could not eat or move easily. I was later told this was the result of adhesions from the extensive intestinal surgery to repair my gunshot wounds.



At the time, I was attending Pan American University. One of my classmates was the young wife of a Pentecostal preacher. Occasionally, we went to the campus chapel to pray. One day she asked me to invite Jesus into my heart. I said that I didn't think He would want to be there, but she encouraged me, and I did.

My next question was, Should I keep Sabbath? I asked my friend who said she would try to find an answer. The next day she brought me a clipping from her church magazine which suggested that one need not keep Sabbath. I knew what the Bible said, so I decided to just go ahead as I had and see what happened.

I prepared as I always did, and when sunset came, it was as if my whole room was filled with golden light. And I thought, "Oh, yes, Jesus loves the Sabbath." I also understood why Pastor Goodwyn invited me to Sabbath School - he loved Jesus and wanted to talk to other people about Him.
